

Travel Tips

n keeping with the **L**Spring Issue of RTO/

Renaissance magazine's travel theme, I have identified some items to address prior to your trip that can minimize stress and disappointment when travelling.

Preparation:

- Check with Johnson Inc/your health service provider regarding out of country travel coverage - especially pre-existing health conditions, baggage and trip cancellation.
- Confirm that your passport is upto-date. You require at least six months remaining to enter the US starting in 2009.
- Obtain a Bell/Other Provider Direct Access World Calling Card. Foreign phone systems can be daunting.
- Confirm the requirements required by your home insurance policy to cover a disaster (fire, flood, break in) to your home while you are away. Many policies require daily inspections to be covered.
- Leave a key with a neighbour, friend, relative (preferably the neighbour across the hall/road) to provide access to your home in case of an emergency. Provide telephone numbers/email addresses where you may be contacted in an emergency.
- Learn how to access your emails

- via the Internet while on vacation. Internet Service Providers (ISP) offer this service.
- Arrange for a neighbour, relative, friend, etc., to pick up your mail/ flyers from your mailbox daily, (Canada Post does not prevent door-to-door flyer delivery.) Arrange for someone to shovel snow, cut grass, etc., to make your home look lived in.
- Use automatic timers to turn house lights on and off at random intervals to suggest that someone is living in your home.
- Inform your executor(s), a relative or a friend where all your critical documents are located in case of death or incapacitation. (A fireproof safe works well.) Place "copies" only in your safety deposit box. It will be sealed upon notification of your death and inaccessible to all but your executor(s) - and then only after a lengthy, timeconsuming process.
- Powers of Attorney (POA) are often not recognized in the US, Mexico and Central America. If you are a "snow bird" and stay for an extended time, contact a local lawyer regarding POA.
- Inform your credit card companies when and where you will be travelling before you leave especially your return date. This will help to prevent fraudulent use

of your credit cards abroad when you return home. This information will also prevent your credit cards from being turned down while you are on vacation. Obtain a duplicate credit card in case the magnetic strip on your credit card fails while you are away. Try to obtain a travel "hotline" phone number, where one phone call will cancel all major credit and other cards if your purse/ wallet is stolen. They operate 24/7, so will be available always. Most banks offer this service.

- Prepay all bills that will come due while you are away.
- Prepay your credit cards before you Premium credit cards, (gold, depart and add additional funds so that you have a credit balance. This facilitates withdrawing small amounts in local currency if needed.
- Be aware that many US banks no longer accept traveller's cheques. You will have to withdraw money using your credit card. This has been caused by fraudulent traveller's cheques being so easy to create these days.

- If you have a pre-existing condition, join Medic Alert to obtain an identification bracelet describing your condition for use by medical personnel if you are confused or unconscious.www.medicalert. ca or 416.696.0267.

Other Items:

- RRSP or RRIF without paying tax. Promoters often promise to return part of the taxpayer's investment by offshore debit or credit cards, offshore bank accounts, or loanback arrangements;
- Immediate access to assets in "locked-in" RRSPs or RRIFs;

The particular investment could be shares in a company, units of participation in a co-operative, a mortgage, or other types of investments.

schemes for two reasons:

- 1 The full amount of any withdrawal or ineligible investment is included in the taxpayer's income in the year the investment was made or the withdrawal occurred. This means that taxes are assessed on these amounts, as well as any applicable interest. Penalties may also be levied for amounts not reported.
- 2 These arrangements can put their retirement savings at risk. In some cases, the promoter walks away with all the funds and cannot be found. Many Canadians have lost their entire retirement savings to unscrupulous promoters by participating in such arrangements. **Source:** Canada Revenue Agency

The letter claims that there is "insufficient information" for the individual's tax return and that in order to receive any "claims," they will have to update their records. The letter attaches a form specifically Taxpayers should avoid these requesting the individual's personal information in writing, via fax or email, including information on bank accounts and passports. This letter is not from the CRA and Canadians should not provide their personal information to the sender.

> All taxpayers should be vigilant when divulging any confidential information to third parties. The CRA has well established practices to protect the confidentiality of taxpayers' information.

> The CRA has notified the proper law enforcement authorities of this scam.





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
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OUR PAST...

A BRIEF GLIMPSE AT OUR BEGINNINGS

from material written by **Art McAdam** (1899-1993) First STO/ERO President, 1968-69

The Canada Pension Plan (CPP) was introduced to take effect on January 1, 1966. Premier John Robarts determined that this pension should not be stacked on top of pensions to which the Ontario Government contributed and which it guaranteed. At a meeting with the Ontario Teachers' Federation (OTF) he proposed that the teachers' contributions to the CPP be paid out of the teachers' 6% contribution to the Teachers' Superannuation Fund (now the Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan). When a teacher retired, that person would receive a pension earned by the combined contribution - in no case would it be less than a regular superannuation pension. If the combined pension were more than a regular pension, the teacher would get the benefit.

At about the same time, the Government voted to compute teacher pensions on the best seven years' salaries [then the best 10]. But when OTF enquired what the Government intended to do for those already on pension because they had contributed the 6% too, the answer was "Nothing".

Nora Hodgins, then Secretary of OTF and for 20 years responsible for the welfare of retirees, was concerned that the superannuated teachers were not organized. If they were, their numbers and expertise could be combined with OTF and maybe the Government could be persuaded to do something for those who had taught on low salaries and had low pensions.

By motion of the OTF Executive, **Art McAdam** was instructed to form a committee and proceed to organize the superannuated teachers! A committee of ten was formed with OTF covering expenses and providing facilities. We owe a great deal to OTF for its help. Without it we could not have started.

OTF drafted a letter to all superannuated teachers (about 4 000) stating our purpose with a proposed constitution and the objectives for such an organization. The letter also asked each person to submit the name of a retired teacher who had been a member of that person's former affiliate and who would consent to be nominated for election to an organization of retired teachers.

Nominations were sorted by affiliate of OTF. The six names most nominated in each group were put on a ballot. The Teachers' Superannuation Commission sent the ballot to every superannuated teacher and requested that *Continued on Page S10** Beginnings continued from Page S9

the person vote for any four nominees. The four names in each group receiving the most votes were declared elected. This made a Senate of 20 members elected by all of the superannuated teachers. When all were assembled an executive was elected: **President Art McAdam; Vice-President Norman McLeod; and, Secretary-Treasurer Marion Tyrrell.**

The Formation of Districts

hen the first Senate Meeting of STO was held in March 1968, the voting delegates were representative of the five affiliates of the Ontario Teachers' Federation. Later that year, an Extension Committee was established to organize STO into geographic Areas across the province based upon the provincial county board system. On December 4, 1968, the Areas were set up:

In 1972 the province was reorganized into 21 sub-divisions to be known as Districts. In 1973, the necessary changes were made to the Constitution and some adjustments were made to the composition of districts. The first Senate meeting to which all voting delegates were named by a district was held in May 1974.

An Early History of RTO/ERO Toronto District 16 ~ 1973/2008

2008 marked the 35th anniversary of RTO/ERO. Retired teachers have good reason to celebrate the foresight and initiative of those who pioneered the founding and growth of our provincial and local district associations.

Toronto is proud to report that the founder and first provincial president of RTO/ERO, **Art McAdam**, was a Toronto member. Mr. McAdam died in the spring of 1993. He had successfully fought for indexed pensions for us all.

Our first district executive met on Wednesday, October 10, 1973. Our first President was **Murdoch McIver** with executive **Allen Sweetman, Vicki McNabb and John Ball, Margaret Kennedy, Ted Stubbs, Bill Darbyshire and Harold Tufts**. There was no newsletter but notices were mailed to members. In 1973, our membership was 540; in 1993 it was well over 1,000; in 2003 was 3297 and as of March 1, 2009 was over 4030.
