



Investment Terms:

- *Initial Investment (II)*: This is the original amount of money that you invested.
- Book Value (BY): This is the initial investment plus profits that are distributed to you annually.
- Market Value (MT): This is the current value of the investments that you own as reported by stock exchanges and other media. Market values are still very depressed because of the current, global, market depression.
- Capital Gains/Losses: Investors incur a capital gain or loss when they sell investments. The capital gain/loss is the difference between the market value and book value of the investment. Capital gains are taxed at 50% of their reported value.
- Unrealized Capital Gain/Loss: a gross oversimplification of risk, value and current market value arithmetical - not mystical. represents the "unrealized" capital are temporary "paper" losses because there will be no actual gain or loss until the investments are sold. That is why financial advisors recommend holding onto

investments until the markets recover. That way, investors will not "realize" a loss.

Risk: Risk is a simple concept, vet one of the most misunderstood issues in investing. Said simply, risk is the propensity for an investment to change in market value over time. Some investments like bonds tend to change less over time and are purchased to reduce the overall volatility of a portfolio. Other securities like equities tend to vary more over time because equities tend to outperform fixed instruments over time. Since the goal of investing is to have your money grow, then upward volatility/risk is a good thing.

Risk is defined in the investment industry as the three-year, standard deviation (change in market value) of an investment. If you purchased an investment for \$100 three years ago and its market value today is \$120, then its standard deviation or risk ratio is 20%, i.e. there is a 20% chance that this investment will increase by 20% in the next three years. In our November, 2008 Newsletter we ramifications of what they were told.) expressed concern regarding the change in routine for amending RTO/ERO Why the Changes (and Our Concerns) Health Benefits. Here is our report on the matter accompanied by our view.

Background: RTO/ERO has prided itself on ownership and management of its Benefits Plans.

The process for managing these Plans until 2008 had the Health Services and Insurance Committee (HS&I) invite suggestions for benefits changes from Members. These suggestions were costed and, if appropriate, recommended to Fall Senate for inclusion in those Plans with requisite premium changes. 2 communication to Senate would alert Senate approval of the changes was typically automatic. Disclosure of changes allowed Senators to closely audit the HS&I proposals and receive detail regarding the rationale for change.

Current Process: Members still have opportunity to submit requests for change to the HS&I. However, aside from the Provincial Executive and the HS&I Committee itself, nobody is informed of changes made to the Plans until they are announced through a general mailing to Benefits Participants only - about six weeks after Fall Senate. We believe this avoidance of Senate is inappropriate in an organization that prides itself on service to its members with open and full disclosure in all its operations.

How the Process Changed: It appears that the HS&I simply informed Senate regarding the change in process and the District Representatives easily gave up their more formal role. (Not being present, we have know knowledge of what type of debate took place at Senate, but there is some indication that some Senators did not fully understand the

In our pursuit of this matter, we came across a few excuses for the changes - none of which alone or together, in our view, provide justification for nondisclosure to Senate. They are:

- 1 protect the fiduciary/liability responsibilities of the HS&I and the Provincial Executive (We have no idea how this relates to taking Plan changes to Senate - even if just for information. In fact, we believe referral to Senate improves the committee's protection. (Should they get another lawyer?)
- any competitors (If our plans are as good as we are led to believe, full disclosure at Senate will not jeopardize our competitive standing. As an aside, it came to our attention that some RTO/ERO members were aware of our competitor's package before they knew of the RTO/ERO improvements.)
- the information can only be disclosed after first being communicated to actual Benefits Participants. (The RTO/ ERO Benefits are owned and managed by RTO/ERO Members - not just those who purchase RTO/ERO insurance.)

Other Concerns: Plans changes are now only in the hands of five individuals - the Provincial Executive (we do not consider the HS&I to be independent since they are appointed by the Provincial Executive).

Solution: Return to full disclosure of Benefits changes to Fall Senate where Member representatives can seek detail regarding HS&I decisions - just as they can with all other RTO/ERO committees. management and Provincial Executive.

Introduction:

- If anyone had told me when I joined Teachers' in 2001 that pensions would be front page news every day in national media around the • world. I would have asked them what they were smoking! Today it's unusual not to see a pension story in your morning paper... and for good reason.
- The other question that I keep asking is `What did Claude know that I didn't? His timing was impeccable!'
- But there are pension stories and there are pension stories: I can tell you it is an honour to lead the • Teachers' Pension Plan. Let me give you an example of why:
- o I was meeting with a former member of Trudeau's inner circle recently, and he remarked on how important this pension plan is because of who it represents: • the people responsible for developing the minds that will define our future society. I couldn't agree with him more. That's what keeps all 750 of us motivated.
- o We talked about not only what an incredibly influential membership we serve, but also how ubiquitous it is; there are • teachers around the dinner tables of just about everyone I know! Including our family table (a son-in-law).
- Our team at Teachers' is singularly focused on one thing: providing the investment and administrative

- service that will give our members - current and future - the best pension their contributions can
- No easy feat in these markets, but that's the challenge we're all committed to delivering on. As our vision statement says: Outstanding Today... Retirement Service Security Tomorrow.

Impact of the Economy:

- As a retired teacher, you want to hear about the economy's impact on your pension plan and what that means to your pension security
- I'm sure you saw and heard the coverage of our rate of return announcement last month and by now have received our annual report and other communications. Let me try to put all of this in perspective for you.
- Yes, we're at \$87.4 billion, compared to \$108.5 billion a year ago. That's a negative 18% return, and it's the average that other large Canadian pension plans also returned. But some markets are down as much as 50%. Anyone with an RRSP or other personal investment portfolio knows what that means.
- It was a humbling year. We're used to finishing the year in the top decile, not at the median. And we certainly aren't used to virtually across-the-board negative returns. Our drop means that three years of value-add have effectively been

- eliminated from the fund. We are The value of the fund as a whole back to mid- 2004.
- Some of the strategies that had paid off for years reversed and cost us dearly last year. Fortunately we were able to move quickly to stem the losses and ensure we were in a highly liquid position through the worst of the storm. Very important. And our main focus was minimizing losses, not making money. It does not make headlines and I don't expect anyone to get all excited, but I can tell you that the smart action of our investment staff, including the termination of some employees, saved us billions of dollars.
- Still, this is very sobering for us. We are used to being a top decile performer, not median. We are not used to losing \$\$ and do not like it.
- But we're a long term investor, which has certain consequences.
 - o A large portion of those 2008 losses are unrealized - they are only paper losses.
 - o Because we invest in high quality assets, like The Eaton Centre, Microsoft, TD Bank. Their value is solid, and we're confident their prices will come back up.
 - o We've got the team with the talent to earn the value back, but it will take a few years
 - o Just like it was investment strategies made a couple of years ago that hurt us this past year, new investments we make today will not pay off for a couple of • I know that it was controversial
- Until stability returns to the market, we are playing defense.

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Pension Security:

- may have fallen in 2008, but the value of members' pension did not.
- Your pension plan is a defined benefit. It's a formula of your years' service and your salary. It doesn't care what the TSX closed at on December 31 or any other day of the year. It only cares how many years you've been contributing and how much you made during those years.
- Not only that, but a member's accrued benefits - the pension credit you've already earned - is protected by legislation.
- I like to remind people that our net cash outflow to pay pensions is around \$2 billion per year, \$87 billion still pays a lot of pensions for a long time

Shortfall:

- We invest with a long time horizon of 70 to 80 years
- Short term challenge is more troubling because we face a threeyear filing reality - we must file a balanced valuation at least once every three years
- The partners solved the 2008 shortfall with the decision to adopt conditional inflation protection
- Our goal always remains to earn enough to accommodate 100% inflation protection i.e. this has not been invoked
- That was the 2008 shortfall.

- I must admit that I thought that I would never have to deal with another funding issue for the rest of • my tenure. But unfortunately we are not out of the woods yet. Any 2009 shortfall also must be resolved
 - o currently only \$2.5 billion, but it will grow in the short term;
 - o \$19.5 billion in losses have been held back in our smoothing adjustment;
 - o those losses will be recognized over the next four years, i.e. about \$5 billion a year, so unless the investment climate turns sharply positive or interest rates move up sharply in the short term, the shortfall is guaranteed to grow.

- So the questions we will be working together to answer are: o Do we file voluntarily now, based

- on the January 1, 2009 valuation, knowing what the shortfall number is, and knowing that it will cost something minimal; probably a contribution rate increase of about one-half of 1% spread over three years - to bring it into balance,
- time for the economy to improve, markets to rebound and fund to regain some value:
- Next required filing would not be until 2012.
- o Or do we wait it out for a year and file voluntarily in 2010, based on the January 1, 2010 valuation to file - knowing that markets are at best flat so far this year, \$5 billion of additional losses will be recognized for valuation purposes and the recovery is not expected before 2010.
- o Or do we really throw the dice and wait until we must file in 2011 knowing that we would only have 19 months all-in for recovery and have to absorb an additional \$10 billion of losses for valuation purposes




