


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



he annual cost-of-**L** living adjustment for 2010 is 0.5%. This is the lowest percentage increase since 1976 - the year in which automatic indexing was introduced. The next lowest was 0.6% in 1995.

The increase takes effect in January and is based on 100% of the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI), a weighted basket of goods and services typically purchased by Canadian households each month. It will increase a typical \$36,000 annual pension by \$180.

The inflation increase determined by comparing the average CPI for the 12-month period ending in September to the previous 12-month average. The method used to calculate the increase is prescribed in the Teachers' pension plan and is the same method used by most other major Ontario pension plans, as well as the CPP.

This year's inflation adjustment is low due to the decline of prices over the past year, primarily driven by a drop in fuel prices. According to Statistics Canada, the cost of gas was 23% less in September 2009 than it was 12 months earlier. Year-overyear inflation (the number reported in the press) has been negative for each of the past four months.

Here's how the increase will affect different pension amounts:

Inflation Increase for 2010

Annual pension	Increase in 2010
\$15,000	\$75
\$20,000	\$100
\$25,000	\$125
\$30,000	\$150
\$35,000	\$175
\$40,000	\$200
\$45,000	\$225
\$50,000	\$250
\$55,000	\$275
\$60,000	\$300

If you left teaching in 2009, the 2010 increase will be pro-rated to the number of months after you stopped working. For example, if you retired in June, you will collect half the increase, or 0.25% more, in 2010.

To see exactly how much your pension has increased as a result of cost-of-living adjustments, sign in to iAccess Web, the secure membersonly section of our website. The latest increase will be posted on your personal web pages in late January. If you aren't yet registered for this free member service, or if you have chosen to receive personal pension information by mail, watch for a printed statement in early February that details your new monthly pension.

"snowbirds" and flee Canada for • Arrange for a neighbour, relative, warmer climes in Winter. Here are a few "travel tips" to help you mind your money while traveling.

Preparation:

- Check with Johnson Inc/your health service provider regarding out of country travel coverage - especially pre-existing health conditions, baggage and trip cancellation.
- Confirm that your passport is upto-date. You require at least six months remaining to enter the US starting in 2009.
- Obtain a Bell/Other Provider Direct Access World Calling Card. Foreign phone systems can be daunting.
- Confirm the requirements required by your home insurance policy to cover a disaster (fire, flood, break in) to your home while you are away. Many policies require daily inspections to be covered.
- Leave a key with a neighbour, friend, relative (preferably the • neighbour across the hall/road) to provide access to your home in case of an emergency. Provide telephone numbers/email addresses where you may be contacted in an emergency.
- Learn how to access your emails via the Internet while on vacation.

Internet Service Providers (ISP) offer this service.

- friend, etc., to pick up your mail/ flyers from your mailbox daily, (Canada Post does not prevent flyer door-to-door delivery.) Arrange for someone to shovel snow, cut grass, etc., to make your home look lived in.
- Use automatic timers to turn house lights on and off at random intervals to suggest that someone is living in your home.
- Inform your executor(s), a relative or a friend where all your critical documents are located in case of death or incapacitation. (A fireproof safe works well.) Place "copies" only in your safety deposit box. It will be sealed upon notification of your death and inaccessible to all but your executor(s).
- Powers of Attorney (POA) are often not recognized in the US, Mexico and Central America. If you are a "snow bird" and stay for an extended time, contact a local lawyer regarding POA.
- Inform your credit card companies when and where you will be travelling before you leave especially your return date. This will help to prevent fraudulent use of your credit cards abroad when you return home. This information will also prevent your credit cards

from being turned down while you are on vacation. Obtain a duplicate credit card in case the magnetic strip on your credit card fails while you are away. Try to obtain a travel "hotline" phone number, where one phone call will cancel all major credit and other cards if your purse/wallet is stolen. They operate 24/7, so will be available always. Most financial institutions offer this service.

- Prepay all bills that will come due while you are away.
- Prepay your credit cards before you depart and add additional funds so that you have a credit balance. This facilitates withdrawing small amounts in local currency if needed.
- Be aware that many US banks no longer accept traveller's cheques. You will have to withdraw money using your credit card. This has been caused by fraudulent traveller's cheques being so easy to create these days.

• If you have a pre-existing condition, join Medic Alert to obtain an identification bracelet describing your condition for use by medical personnel if you are confused or unconscious. www. medicalert.ca or 416•696•0267.

Other Items:

- Premium credit cards, (gold, platinum) for which you pay an additional annual fee, usually provide extended insurance coverage for baggage loss, trip cancellation, extended warranty on major items purchased with the card, automobile rental collision insurance, etc. You might be able to avoid buying travel insurance included in a package vacation if you are covered already by Johnson or a credit card.
- If travelling to an exotic If you will be renting a car while on vacation, determine who and what is covered for the rental car by your current Canadian car insurance. Premium credit cards often provide collision coverage. You might require additional coverage for people not named in your existing car insurance.
 - "On-line" / Internet purchase of vacation packages are seldom, if ever, protected by provincial law.





When out of the country and needing medical assistance, should one seek treatment immediately at the nearest clinic/ doctor's office and then contact Mondial Assistance or must one contact Mondial first?

In a medical emergency, please dial 911 where available and Care Plan covers the services proceed to the nearest hospital. Once you have reached the hospital, contact Mondial Assistance.

- Following non-elective surgery, coverage is available at 80% to a daily maximum of \$75 per day for up to 3 days of care.

If your hospital stay or nonelective day surgery is planned, contact Johnson Inc. to request the authorization form, request your physician's recommendation, and arrange the services ahead of time. Pecent Appeals To date in 2009, four appeals have been heard - two in May, one in July and one in September, with a fifth slated for later this Fall. In each • of the four appeals, the BAC panels, after very careful consideration and often lengthy deliberations, denied each appeal.

The following is a brief synopsis of the issues in play for each appeal:

- Should the member be permitted to retroactively cease pension payments from the Plan and re-enroll as an active member • contributing to the Plan for a specified period of time? The Plan administrator was being asked to extend the deadline for an active member election so as to permit the member to be reinstated as an active member and thus able to accrue additional credited service.

Budget Proposal for 2010

The proposed budget for 2010 is based on the following assumptions:

- Increase in membership of 2.9% in 2010;
- teachers' pensions of 0.7%;
- Anticipated increase in RTO/ERO Health Plan Premiums:
- Membership fees' increase from \$1.20 to \$1.25 per \$1000.

The overall net change in the 2010 Budget over 2009 is \$331,000 (6%). The increased funding comes from the following sources:

• Membership Fees (budget line 3700) are projected to increase by \$1.25 to \$1.10 (12%) following hiring of a full time IT several years of surpluses in the

Here are the arguments against the motion:

- In the Spring Senate of 2008, there was significant support to limit Full membership to teachers who have retired with an Ontario Teacher's pension. This motion is contrary to this decision and direction.
- One of the main priorities of RTO/ERO is for pension advocacy; however, people who commute have no vested interest in Teacher's pensions.
- Currently, most members (who commuted) do not want to have their RTO/ERO fees raised so that they can become full members.
- Currently, most members (who commuted) have not expressed any interest in becoming a Full member and may be opposed to changing their membership status.

Below are some facts:

- The number of "commuted" members who joined prior to turning 50 over the last three years are 0,1, and 1 respectively (RTO/ERO database).
- There are currently 586 "commuted" members (RTO/ERO database).
- The average amount for Full membership is \$50. This would represent a 6.4% increase from \$47 (RTO/ERO data).
- The actual credited service for people commuting prior to turning 50 is 13.2 years (OTPP).
- Out of the 40 who commuted prior to their 50th birthday, 10 had a shortened life expectancy (OTPP).
- No evidence to confirm that most of the 40 retired at the same time as their spouse.
- No evidence to confirm nor refute that most members would support a fee increase to become a Full member.
- The number of people who have commuted are at a low rate since the age "Age 50" plan change (OTPP).

Conclusion

After consulting with the Ontario Teachers Pension Plan on commuted value and Committee discussions, the following motion has been drafted: That Article 4 - Membership, 4.01 Full Member, be amended to include a retired teacher with a minimum of 15 years of credited service who opted for a commuted value transfer from the Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan following the Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan rules in place at the time of commutation.

Rationale For Or Against Support

So... you want Catastrophic Drug Coverage!

The issue of catastrophic drug prescription coverage is being studied by the RTO/ERO HS&I Committee. As one knows from media accounts, newer drugs come to market at prohibitive prices. Costs for these drugs are even a concern for provincial governments that are afraid to increase taxes, or stop funding some programs, in order to cover these new costs. We are told that by 2015, Ontario health-care costs will use 50% of the provincial budget. TDSB retirees may be advised to stay with their Board coverage.

As we go to press, RTO/ERO has made no decision on this matter as far as we know. However, one insurer provides a plan that gives retirees:

- 100% coverage, with no annual maximum, for generic and name brand prescription drugs, when eligible claims exceed \$4,500 per calendar vear.
- An additional \$25,000 in combined coverage per calendar year, to a \$100,000 lifetime maximum, for home care, private duty nursing, durable medical equipment (wheelchairs, etc.) and prosthetic appliances when paid claims exceed \$7,500 per calendar year.

- Unlimited chiropractor and physiotherapist coverage for 12 consecutive months following an accident that requires a hospital stay of at least 24 hours once the \$700 paramedical services maximum has been reached.
- Premiums that are up to 53% greater than those with non-catastrophic coverage;
- Termination falls on the January 1 renewal, following the insured's 65th birthday. After age 65, many of your prescription drugs will be covered by the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB).
