Sample RTO/ERO Acknowledgement, Waiver & Release

RTO/ERO demands that Districts be advised the waiver. that the waiver and or reference to the waiver should accompany all advertisements for trips and special events as follows:

It is acceptable to publish the waiver in a newsletter or on the District web site and to have each participant sign on the registration form that s/he has read and agree to the statements in the waiver. The signature cannot be on a blanket form i.e. for unspecified trips/ events over a period of time. A District may list a number of events on one page, but each participant must sign off against each trip/ event in which s/he plans to participate and must sign off on having seen and agreed to

It would be prudent that Districts include advice to participants in any trip/event that requires physical activity/effort beyond what they ordinarily exert. Participants should be advised to consult their doctor especially if they have a pre-existing condition that raises

Districts should retain signed waivers for one year in cases where nothing untoward has occurred. Where there has been an incident. the District Executive should consult with the Director of Financial, Business and Building Services at the Provincial Office about how long waivers should be retained. 16

our Executive, since the March Newsletter, has:

- appointed Joan Pennings as secretary to June, 2011; appointed R. Harvey and L. Smith as Spring Senate Senators with D. Shanoff and B. Putnam as Observers;
- approved the payment of expenses for both Observers
- received resignation from Fran Pavkovic, secretary
- agreed that District 16 oppose any 2012 Membership Fee increase:
- agreed that all District 16 financial documents submitted to the Executive at its meetings be available to its membership upon request in PDF format
- donated \$500 towards Japanese Relief through an appropriate agency
- approved the following motions to be presented to Spring Senate:
 - that, effective January 1, 2012, the RTO/ERO Constitution be amended to reduce payment of the District Rebate by 1% annually until such time as the District Rebate becomes 25% of Members Fees (currently 30%)
 - that, beginning with the Fall Senate 2011, the salary ranges for all RTO/ ERO employee levels, including any salaries, stipends or payments of any kind to those contracted to work for RTO/ERO, the RTO/ERO Charitable Foundation and the RTO/ERO Chair in Geriatrics be fully reported to Fall Senates
 - that beginning January, 2012, all RTO/ERO employee and executive expenses charged to corporate accounts be available to District Presidents that all grants paid to districts according to By-Law 2 be itemized by district and reported annually to spring senate.

(Note: your District 16 Executive believes that RTO/ERO fiscal responsibility is beyond reproach. These motions are designed to enhance current practice.)

- At the Fall 2010 Senate, the 2011 Budget approved retaining 30% grants to Districts resulting in a deficit budget with no Contingency Fund. Therefore the 2011 Budget is proposed to be reduced by \$80,000 and the future funding of Districts to be adjusted. See box on Page 8. If concerned, contact your Editor.

Allocation of Funds to Districts [emphasis added]

Districts' annual grants now constitute 30% of the RTO/ERO membership fee. Additional subsidies to small Districts raises the total payment to 34%. Up to 2004, Districts received 25% of membership fees. This was raised to 30% in 2005 to compensate for a reduced membership fees from \$1.25 per thousand of pension to \$1.10 and the folding in of former Goodwill and Recruitment Grants. Membership fees returned to \$1.25 in 2010 with Districts continuing to receive 30%. Thus the Provincial Office's share of the total membership fees has shrunk from 72% to 66%.

With the creation of new small Districts and increases in the minimum grant, the number of Districts receiving minimum grant doubled from 9 to 18 and quadrupled in dollar amount from \$20,563 in 2004 to \$81,284 in 2011. The Minimum Grant increased by 69% from 2004 to 2011 with the minimum grant per capita ranging now from \$16.50 to \$104.66. The gap between grants per member has been widening with small Districts receiving disproportionately higher grants than larger Districts.

The challenge for the Provincial Office has been to manage increased, mandated programs, services and expectations with a smaller percentage of the budget. There have been no mandated programs or expectations to Districts that did not have funding attached. The suggestion to increase fees to members in order to solve the financial bind of the Provincial Office is not a permanent fix, as the systemic problem of a diminished proportion of the total grant would not be addressed.

Proposed Parameters to Address the Allocation of Funds to Districts

- 1. District Grants with subsidies be established at a maximum level of 29% of total funds received from Member Fees phased in over four years;
- 2. Minimum Grants be frozen at the 2011 level of \$10,978;
- 3. Size and Density grants be phased out over six years;
- 4. A best-estimate three-year projection be provided annually to demonstrate the likely outcome of the implementation of the new parameters;
- 5. Any future recommendation for new/expanded programs/services must be accompanied by a cost estimate and indication of the source of funding. [Editors: On this redistribution of finances matter, your Toronto Senators will be guided by the positions already taken by your Executive: a) no fee increase; b) accept a gradual reduction in district finances (to be offset by increased membership and pension increases); c) opposition to creation of small districts; d) concerns about spread in per-member district income. Watch our June &-zine for an update.]

capital from Europe and the Middle East, which should lower the cost of capital and help boost share values of Canadian firms.

- As a major international investor, Teachers' is concerned that should Canadian governments treat foreign investors less favourably than domestic investors, it will be viewed by other countries as parochial at best. and at worst as protectionist; and we may lose access to foreign investment opportunities on behalf of our beneficiaries, Ontario's teachers.
- As capital markets become increasingly integrated, it is critical that Canada not be isolated with a standalone exchange. Given that Canada represents less than three per cent of the total global market capital, it is far better to be a meaningful part of a larger global exchange. We risk being further marginalized.
- Today's exchanges are no longer protected monopolies regarded as vital to the functioning of national economies. TMX became a publicly traded company in 2002 and is subject to intense competition from alternative trading systems. It risks becoming irrelevant entirely if it cannot compete in the global market place through a merger with other exchanges. 16

The Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan held its annual meeting in Toronto 2 on April 7 at the Arcadian Court. The AGM was also webcast for the benefit of those not able to attend. RTO/ERO Toronto was represented by your President (David Shanoff), Pension Chair (Sashi Makhija) and Newsletter Editor (Bill Menagh). The provincial RTO/ERO was represented by the Provincial Executive and Pension and Retirement Concerns Committee. Also in attendance were a number of practicing and retired teachers who wanted to audit the proceedings, ask pertinent questions or use the opportunity to espouse their Special Interest Group's point of view on aspects of the OTPP investment strategies - more on this below.

For those of you who subscribe to the OTPP website's email service or have visited their website or read in the media about the Plan's 2010 progress, the following will be known:

- Plan Sponsors are The Ontario Teachers' Federation and the Government of Ontario; they stipulate how the Plan is funded;
- Plan Administrators, by law, must invest the funds to meet the fiduciary requirements of those laws;
- Responsible Investment is practiced within legislated fiduciary requirements by:
 - Actively being involved in corporate governance standards;
 - Supporting shareholder proposals related to enhancing shareholder democracy and rights (voting, separation of CEO and chair roles, declassify boards' voting structure, right to call a Special Meeting, establishing pay-for-performance where this is not evident);
 - Investing as signatories to Carbon Disclosure Project;
 - Monitoring the United Nations Principles for Responsible Investment
- Assets increased by \$13.3 billion (\$4.0 billion above benchmark)
- 2010 rate of return on investments was 14.3%;
- Net assets are \$107.5 billion;
- Funding Shortfall is \$17.2 billion (an actuarial figure);
- Assets are now about even to those of 2007 before the economic meltdown of 2008:

- Retirees are collecting their pension for about 30 years
- 2010 retirees have worked about 26 years;
- Plan sponsors are currently discussing any advantage to filing a fully funded evaluation in 2011 (a requirement every three years but optional in other years; an evaluation must stipulate what will be done to negate any deficit or use any surplus);
- Sponsors currently can increase contribution rates to 15% of salary or invoke conditional inflation protection or other tools of equal value;
- 1.5 active to 1.0 retired member ratio (10:1 in 1970/4:1 in 1990);
- Pension payments exceeded contributions by \$1.8 billion;
- 2010 interest rate of 1.1% compared to 10-year average of 2.2%;
- The current global economy is influenced by natural disasters, wars, political disruption.

Special Interest Group Involvement

The question and answer session produced a wide range of pertinent questions - all appropriate for an AGM and all answered to the satisfaction of your Editor. Specific questions were raised regarding: water investments in Chile; environmental protection for grandchildren; a company supplying Israel with arms used against Palestinians, withdrawing pension contributions because of disagreement with investments; size of some administrators' pensions rumoured to be in the range of \$250,000; OTPP working with the UN; moving assets out of fossil fuels; justifying executive pay; structuring the meeting to avoid political diatribe; steps required to redress balance of Plan; divestment of Maple Leafs; OTPP at shareholders' meetings. Sadly, many of the speakers were quick to loose the patience of the audience with their prepared, written speeches; their monopolization of the microphone; their histrionics when asked to get to their question; their unfortunate use of tactics best suited to public demonstrations. One teachers' union representative had to clarify that some of the comments made did not represent the position of the union. Those asking their question tersely and to the point generated audience applause while those pontificating with no apparent question endured the audience's boos and jeers.

So, what were the answers? Some of the above concerns are as follows (not in order):

- In-house investment strategy is being enhanced by the hiring of staff familiar with changing technologies;
- Fiduciary responsibilities prevent investments based on single-issue considerations; Continued on Page 27

- It is trusted that Boards of Education are being honest with the reporting of pensionable earnings (and not feathering the nest of a chosen few - our words);
- Boards of Education have strict guidelines on the reporting of employees' pensionable income;
- Closely monitoring the quality of management of companies ensures a more ethical operation of those companies;
- A portion of the OTPP website is devoted to Responsible Investing to try to explain common concerns in this area that are perennial issues raised at the AGM;
- Only the Ontario Government and the Ontario Teachers' Federation (Plan Partners) will determine how the plan is re-balanced.

Consider going to next years' OTPP AGM - you should at least once in your life. The light refreshments at the end are quite tasty.

From OTPP Governance: Teachers' says 'yes' to TMX and LSEG merger (March 15, 2011): After careful analysis of the proposed merger between the TMX Group Inc. (TMX) and the London Stock Exchange Group plc (LSEG), our view is that the merits of the merger outweigh any drawbacks. Should the merger proceed, we believe that regulation pertaining to publicly traded companies must be robust and effective and remain under the control of Canadian regulatory authorities.

Specifically, we support the proposed merger for the following reasons:

- It is important to ensure that Teachers' and other investors have access to an effective, low cost trading platform to execute both cash and derivative trades. The combined exchange operator should be able to achieve economies of scale, lowering the cost of capital and trading costs.
- It is important that Canadian companies have access to greater market liquidity and low cost capital. Through the proposed merger, Canadian firms should benefit from a deeper pool of investors, attracting greater

Reminding Canadians about **Using Acetaminophen Safely**

With the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) deciding to change dosage requirements prescription acetaminophen combination products, Health Canada is updating Canadians on steps it is taking to determine if any new action may be needed to protect health and safety in addition to the recent updating of its acetaminophen labelling standard.

Prescription and non-prescription acetaminophen-containing products have a long history of treating pain and fever. When used as directed, they are considered to be both Health Resources safe and effective. Concerns have Public Health Agency of Canada been raised, however, by reports of www.hc-sc.gc.ca/hl-vs/seniorsacetaminophen overdose resulting aines/index-eng.php in serious and sometimes fatal liver Seniors and Aging - Preventing Falls damage.

In September 2009, Health Canada vie/fp-pc-eng.php finalized a new labelling standard You can prevent falls - A guide to non-prescription products

containing acetaminophen. This labelling standard contains warning of potential serious and possibly fatal liver damage in the event of an overdose.

In addition, there are a number of steps everyone should follow to take medication(s) safely:

Always read the product label and follow the instructions;

- Be careful when taking multiple products at once. For example, acetaminophen is contained in some pain relievers as well as decongestants and cough and cold remedies. In such cases, be careful to avoid exceeding the maximum recommended daily dosage of acetaminophen from the combined sources by considering product labelling and medication instructions:
- With prescription products, talk to your doctor, pharmacist, care professional and follow their instructions; and know when to take medication, how often, and for how long.



Applicants must include the following:

- Proof of enrollment for the 2011-2012 academic year see below,
- A current academic/extra-curricular/co-curricular/leadership letter of reference.
- A current community/volunteer/coordinator/employer letter of reference
- A minimum 300-word essay,
- A fully completed application.

Deadline Date: The deadline date is 4:30 p.m., Eastern Daylight Time on August 8, 2011. Applications received after the deadline date will be considered late and not eligible for consideration. Applications are available only in an on-line completion format at the RTO/ERO website:

www.rto-ero.org; no hard copies of this application will be available.

Project – Service To Others, 2012

Background Information reflecting RTO/ERO Toronto RoutinesWhat Is *Project – Service To Others*?

Project – Service to Others is a Provincial RTO/ERO program that provides grants to Districts for initiatives that support the concept of "Service to Others". The intent is to contribute to a variety of community projects and thereby raise the profile of the RTO/ERO by demonstrating to active teachers and to the public that retired teachers care about their communities and about public education, and are willing to help others who need assistance. These assistance projects could be in any form that supports the goals of Project – Service to Others as outlined below.

Goals

- Provide financial assistance to education-related and other community projects.
- Facilitate member participation in education and/or community projects.
- Promote District/Unit participation in local, provincial and overseas educational/community projects.
- Raise the profile of retired teachers and of RTO/ERO.
- Demonstrate to the general public that retired teachers continue to serve after retirement.
- Demonstrate to potential RTO/ERO members that RTO/ERO is a dynamic organization to which they should consider belonging when they retire from active teaching.

How It Works

- Through their Districts, individuals or groups apply to the Provincial Project Service to Others Committee for funding. Applications shall be limited to a maximum of 5 double-sided pages, in addition to the application itself.
- A project will only be funded once. Projects that are extended or are ongoing must find other sources of funding to continue.
- A District that has received funding must submit an interim report by January 31 of the next year and a final report at the conclusion of the project to be eligible to apply for the funding of future projects.
- A District may submit no more than one proposal for submission to the Provincial Committee in any year.
- The maximum grant for a project is \$4000. A project may be supplemented by contributions from other sources.
