Extended Health Care Plan

- Best Doctors added.
- Prescription Drug benefit maximum increased to \$3,200
- Paramedical Practitioners maximum increased to \$1,200 for all practitioners combined (acupuncture and foot care services provided by a registered nurse added).
- Eye Examination benefit increase to \$150 for multiple visits in any two consecutive calendar years for you/spouse, and in each calendar year for eligible dependent children.
- Prescription eyewear and the maximum for prescribed contact lenses increased to \$400
- The additional lifetime maximum for new lenses required due to eye surgery increased to \$400
- Maximum for purchase/repair of hearing aids increased to \$1,100 per person every five calendar years. (Changed to coincide with the eligibility period of the Ontario Assistive Devices Program (ADP) with replacements being reimbursed every five years.)

Teachers Pension Plan increase for

2016. The Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System (OMERS), announced its pension increase at the end of November as follows:

The Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System (OMERS) announced that pensions will increase by 1.16% as of January 1, 2016. This increase reflects the change in the cost of living as measured by the Canadian Consumer Price Index (CPI).

OMERS inflation protection increases retirement, disability and survivor pensions each year. OMERS uses a similar method to that used by the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) to calculate its annual increase for pensions, but CPP has a different rounding approach.

In late December 2015, OMERS sent an Annual Statement of Pension to members and survivors, with their updated pension amount for 2016. Members whose pensions began in 2015 will receive a pro-rated increase.

Here's how this year's increase was calculated:

$$(\frac{126.26}{124.81} - 1) \times 100 = 1.16\%$$

Editors: Our November Newsletter informed you of the 2016 OTPP pension increase of 1.3%. The difference is accounted for by the 12-month period on which the Consumer Price Index change is based: OTPP from October to September; OMERS from November to October. Over time, the calculations balance and there is little or no accumulated difference.




Sites You Have Not Seen, Stories You Have Not Heard Presented by Gib Goodfellow

7 t the hotel pool in Kathmandu I overheard the tour organizer bragging that he had been to Italy a dozen times but his next trip would include all the things he had not done. Sure enough. We landed in Rome and took off immediately for Sorrento where we had two nights. We drove right past Pompeii on our way to Herculaneum, the city buried in ash which preserved both wood and decorations. We spent some time on the Amalfi Coast, but did not make it to the Isle of Capri because our leader had been there. We had the best meal of the trip at a farm in the Sila Mountains in Calabria. The network of tunnels and aerial-highways are feats of engineering.

We took a ferry to Sicily where we stayed in Taormina, Agrigento, and Palermo to visit Mt. Ethan, the Greek sites at Syracuse, the Roman hunting lodge at Casale, and the Valley of the Temples. Then on to Sardinia where we spent four nights with days full of sightseeing including fortified dwellings and stone towers built before the Phoenicians arrived. The spectacular Emerald Coast offered wonderful vistas. At Alghero, I experienced the most beautiful swim of my life.

We had our second overnight crossing, disembarking at Genoa, Italy's largest port. After a city tour we drove to the Cinque Terre Region, where Phyllis, a friend and I walked through 12 kilometres of vinyards between the five villages which cling to the cliffs. In Tuscany, we explored the walled medieval centre of Lucca and walled village of San Gimignano on a mountainside. Enroute to San Gimignano, we drove by the leaning tower of Pisa. The leader had not intended originally to stop but there was a vote taken and the bus made a U-turn. We had a one day tour of Rome and another day to explore Rome on our own. An elevator saves climbing the stairs to the main deck, if need be. Optional shore-excursions are available. The owners are in close touch with relevant authorities (Parks Canada), and, are acquainted with every bend in the bodies of water covered, the local history, and the flora and fauna. On our trip we witnessed our captain exploring the use of a new drone used to take photos of the journey from above. Questions are welcomed as the crew enjoy sitting with passengers at all meals. Everyone lets their hair down at a final comedy show as the cruise ends. The atmosphere is warm and friendly at all times, even for the single traveller. Fate willing, we will be going back for our third trip this summer. You might want to join us.

This trip accommodated the needs of older adults like ourselves with certain disabilities all too common for folks our age but also a yen for new sights and sounds, congenial fellow travellers not prone to loud late night revels, good food, drink plus home made snacks, knowledgeable commentary and on shore excursions that do not overly challenge our current energy level, but satisfy our love of history and adventure. The young crew who are the wait staff, also cheerfully wash the windows and help maintain the common areas. Project STO (Service To Others) Grants ~ 2016

Our provincial organization gives its districts an opportunity to support a member's favourite organization in the amount of up to \$4,000. It is important that applicants understand the process. Here is a brief outline:

* * *

A Toronto District 16 application must be submitted to the provincial office by a specific date. *To this end, individual applications must be received by the President, Roger Wilson, by our closure date of March 1, 2016*, to be considered by the Toronto Executive. Just one project, if any, can be selected. The Toronto Executive makes the final decision about which project, if any, is forwarded to the provincial Service-to-Others (STO) Committee. Although all applications may be worthy of consideration, only one per district is allowed to go forward. Those applications meeting the basic criteria for the grant are selected for further consideration; those not meeting the basic criteria are rejected outright. (The process, although somewhat subjective, is based on which application best meets the stipulated conditions.) Applicants are informed of the disposition of their submissions.

The RTO/ERO STO Committee considers, potentially, 48 applications from districts over the summer, and meets in September to decide the degree of support and which projects will receive that support. In 2015, our proposal received 3,000.00. Our January Newsletter listed all 2015 recipients.

NOTE: It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the application is completed according to the stipulated directions. Although an executive member may give guidance, such assistance should not be considered support. The full executive will make a decision regarding one, or none, of the submissions.

The writer also expressed concern that these types of content were unsigned - that personal opinion ought to be attributable. Another member, having similar concerns, chose to speak personally to the editor to express well-thought counter-points.

To those members who communicated their concerns, and to others for whom this item (and, perhaps, others) was found to be 'inaccurate, insulting, and offensive', we apologize for the unintended outcome of our Merceresque humour. Upsetting any reader is never our goal. Provoking thought? Maybe.

As to attribution, most of the Newsletter content has a name, or source, attached. It had been assumed that unattributed material was known to be that of the editors - specifically **Bill Menagh** (even our silly 'fillers').

So, what to do? We know many members have wanted our organization to be seen as more politically active. Members have followed procedures, through their District to the Senate, to have RTO/ERO take positions on specific societal issues: health care, aging, defined benefits pension plans, national pharma-care, the environment, improved CPP/OAS coverage; affordable and supportive housing, financial support and workplace protection for caregivers. RTO/ERO is a member of the Canadian Association of Retired Teachers (ACER-CART) and aligns with CARP on like-minded issues (May, 2015 Newsletter). We do support legislation designed to enhance these specific issues. We know there are 'progressives' in all parties supportive of some or all the above and try to influence their parties positively from the inside.


