- 1. RTO/ERO was inaugurated in 1968.
- 2. The Health Services and Insurance Committee's predecessor, The Health and Welfare Committee, was established in 1969.
- 3. RTO/ERO serves more than 41,000 retired teachers.
- 4. The basic philosophy and mandate of the RTO/ERO Health Services and Insurance Committee is to provide the greatest amount of coverage for the largest number of participants at the lowest possible cost to the individual.
- 5. The RTO/ERO Group Benefits Program is unique in that all participants are retired or are survivors of retirees.
- 6. The total cost of the RTO/ERO Group Benefits Program is borne by the participants.
- 7. Participants in the Plan range in age from 55 to over 100, with some survivors of retirees under age 55.

THESE RULES WERE POSTED IN THE CLASSROOM OF THE VILLAGE SCHOOL HOUSE AT MUSKOKA PIONEER VILLAGE (c.1872)

Rules for Students:

- 1. Respect your schoolmaster. Obey him and accept his punishments.
- 2. Do not call your classmates names or fight with them. Love and help each other.
- 3. Never make noises or disturb your neighbours as they work.
- 4. Be silent during classes. Do not talk unless it is absolutely necessary.
- 5. Do not leave your seat without permission.
- 6. No more than one student at a time may go to the washroom.
- 7. At the end of class, wash your hands and face. Wash your feet if they are bare.
- 8. Bring firewood into the classroom for the stove whenever the teacher tells you.
- 9. Go quietly in and out of the classroom.
- 10. If the master calls your name after class, straighten the benches and tables. Sweep the room, dust, and leave everything tidy.

Rules for Teachers:

- 1. Teachers each day will fill lamps, clean chimneys.
- 2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session.
- 3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupil.
- 4. Men teachers may take one evening for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
- 5. After ten hours in school, the teacher may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
- 6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
- 7. Every teacher should lay aside a goodly sum of his earnings from each pay for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
- 8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool halls or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention and honesty.

NOTE: The teacher who performs his labour faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay providing the Board of Education approves.

MINDING YOUR MONEY

Snowbirds Beware!

This information is for snowbirds and the newly retired. The US Internal Revenue Service (IRS) wants your money! Canadian residents spending more than 183 days in the US during a calendar year (averaged over three years) may be taxed by the IRS. Be aware of this money grab when planning long stays in the US.

Retroactive Lump-Sum Pension Payment Rebates

There appears to be much confusion over how to apply for a tax rebate on the excessive income taxes paid on recent lump-sum, pension payments. Simply speaking, the Ontario Teachers' Pension Board will issue information documents to *all* RTO/ERO members who received lump sum payments – whether they contacted RTO/ERO or not. These documents will detail all the information that Revenue Canada requires to re-assess their income tax returns. Upon receipt of this document, RTO/ERO members must *write a letter* to their local Revenue Canada district office requesting that their pertinent past income tax returns be re-assessed. Be sure to retain a copy of the pension board document.

Age 69 & RRSPs

If you were born in 1930, you turn 69 this year and must collapse your RRSPs. For a free information guideline on the options available to you, see the directions at the end of this column.

Demutualization of Insurance Companies

In order to increase their capital and expand their product line, five large insurance companies in Canada have demutualized and *gone public*. This action has provided windfall profits of thousands of dollars for holders of participating policies. Distributions are available as cash, shares in the new firm or a combination of both. Those policyholders opting for cash will be taxed as receiving dividend income at 66% of the total cash received *in the year that they receive the cash*. Those opting for shares will be taxed as capital gains at 75% of the total value of the shares *as they are cashed*. Opting to take shares, then selling them over a number of years will reduce the total tax burden. Like the lump-sum pension payment, RTO/ERO members opting for cash, will experience a large tax bite, OAS clawback and interference with medical subsidies.
