This is the governing body of S.T.O. It meets twice a year in May and November. Each district (31) sends a Senator who holds voting rights for that District, and may send observers. Our Senator was our President, Molly Moore. Our observers were Sid Coles, Harold Dean and Elizabeth Patterson.


S.T.O. and Confederation Life re-negotiated monthly premium rates this spring. An increase was necessary in both the Semi-Private Hospital Plan and the Dental Plan because both groups were in a loss position du to increased use of benefits. New rates became effective July 1, 1982.

The Health Services Committee noted that, in comparison with other group health insurance plans with comparable coverage, our premiums are substantially lower.

N.B. - The policy year for all S.T.O. Health plans is July 1 to June 30. Changes may only be made July 1 BUT the deductible year applying to Extended Health Care is the calendar year. Each January subscribers can qualify for 90% of claims only after the deductibles (\$50.00 - single; \$75.00 - couple; \$100.00 - family) are satisfied.

In November 1981, the Senate defeated the motion that indexing coincide with cost of living. It was a close vote (19 - 18).

New motions were received by the Superannuation Committee.

North York (District 23) again asked for cost-of-living indexing.

Wentworth and Haldimand (District 13) opposed the North York motion.

Ottawa-Carleton, Prescott and Russell (District 27) compromised with,

"That for the next three years (1983-4-5) the cumulative carry-over credited to each pensioner in the superannuation adjustment fund be paid out in three instalments to pensioners along with their 8% increment: and that at the end of those three years the validity of the 8% be reviewed in the light of economic conditions then prevailing".

On April 23rd, the $\underline{0.T.F.}$ Superannuation Committee requested that the Minister of Education amend the Teachers' Superannuation Adjustment Benefits Act so that indexing coincide with the \underline{cc} st of living increase. In light of this, the $\underline{S.T.0.}$ Superannuation Committee also recommended full indexing of pensions to the Senate.

The Final Report of the Select Committee on Pensions had meanwhile recommended discontinuing the Superannuation Adjustment Benefits Act (SABA) and giving responsibility for payments through that Act to the main Teachers' Superannuation Fund:

S.T.O. members should understand that teachers who retired after 1975, have their indexed increases paid for by the Superannuation Adjustment Benefits Act (SABA), while teachers who retired before 1975, have their indexed increases paid for out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Province.

The O.T.F. Superannuation Committee opposed the elimination of SABA. The S.T.O. Superannuation Committee recommended:

"That the Superannuated Teachers of Ontario support the continuance of the Superannuation Adjustment Benefits Act, the repeal of which was recommended by the Select Committee on Pensions in April 1982".

One other problem faced our committee - very low pensions for some of our members.

The S.T.O. committee recommended "That consideration be given to improving low pensions to ensure that no superannuated teachers should be on or below the poverty level".

The Senate deliberated on the five motions and passed two of them,

To improve low pensions
To continue SABA

Now the two resolutions have been forwarded to 0.T.F. Let us expect and hope that the present escalation program will continue. It certainly has been a blessing to us all.

RE GOODWILL COMMITTEE

In the last six months, the S.T.O. Provincial Goodwill Committee received 16 requests for financial aid. Most of these come from widows on low pensions. A total of \$6,400.00 was paid to 16 applicants ranging from two receiving \$100.00 to 4 receiving \$750.00.



Some severe losses were caused through the collapse of CHSO the now defunct Health Plan. To assist members re these one-time requests, a total of 32,715.00 was paid to 9 applicants.

Ald. PETER CLARKE Bought property

North York Ald. Peter Clarke, who had the "criminal intention of a common street thief," has been convicted of one count of fraud and five counts of theft for ripping off Co-operative Health Services of more than \$600,000.

County court Judge Hugh Locke convicted Clarke, general manager and treasurer of the now-defunct health insurance company, Friday.

Locke said Clarke "tapped the corporate till with the same criminal intention of a common street thief" except that in Clarke's case, his employers trusted him.

"He said that during testimony, Clarke was "shifty, evasive and less than forthright" in answering questions put to him by Crown attorney Frank Armstrong

attorney Frank Armstrong.

Clarke, 38, of Byng Ave., had pleaded not guilty to five counts of theft, five of fraud and one of breach of trust following his arrest after the February 1981 collapse of CHSO.
