# North York alderman gets 18-month term

A County Court judge has sentenced North York Alderman Peter Clarke to 18 months in reformatory for bleeding a health insurance company dry through a series of acts "of pure theft . . . motivated by pure greed".

The diminutive politician took the sentence calmly, staring straight ahead as Judge Hugh Locke spoke of his having used his "active, cunning mind" to run Co-operative Health Services of Ontario into the ground.

"It is clear that before Mr. Clarke funnelled Co-op money for his own use it was a viable company in the process of succeeding financially," the judge said. "Co-op is and always has been a corporate victim."

The company collected premiums from its 140,000 subscribers in return for insurance on items not covered by the Ontario Health Insurance Plan, such as dental care and extended health care.

# Report of the Health Services Committee to the Senate

Inquiries have been received from some subscribers regarding further dental coverage. Here are the facts.

- (a) Our current premium rates are based on the O.D.A. 1981 fee schedule,
- (b) The 1982 O.D.A. premium schedule would be at least 11% higher.
  (c) The monthly premiums for each of the following to amend the plan (basis of the 1981 O.D.A. fee schedule), would be higher by:

# Report of the Superannuation Committee to the Senate

O.T.F. negotiations for improvements in the Teachers' Superannuation Act had reached an agreement in principle on the 29 points outlined by O.T.F. The Committee was concerned that the Government did not intend to make any of these changes retroactive to teachers already on pension. An adjustment in low pensions is the only benefit being considered for retirees.

The Senate approved the following recommendations from the Superannuation Committee:

"That S.T.O. approve the principle of making superannuation improvements applicable to persons receiving pensions or allowances under the Teachers' Superannuation Act."

# Kindergarten pioneers put Toronto on map

This year, at parties throughout Toronto, thousands of children will celebrate the 100th anniversary of an event that occurred here in September, 1883.

When the Toronto Board of Education published its own Centennial Story, it said

For it was in Toronto, on the site of the present Eaton Centre, and in the midst of one of the city's bitterest battles, that the

first public school kindergarten in the British Empire was opened.

Today, kindergartens are such an accepted part of most children's lives that almost everyone has forgotten what a storm of protest they created when they were introduced a century ago in Toron-

They were denounced by the clergy. Angry taxpayers said they would refuse to pay for them. And even 20 years later, they were still being attacked by such celebrated figures as Vincent Massey, who would become Canada's first nativeborn governor-general.

# Changed School Act

But, despite the controversy, the Toronthis event "made Toronto famous throughout the educational world of Canada, the United States and even in Britain."

But, despite the controversy, the Toronto Board of Education continued to open more and more kindergartens; and the Ontario government changed its School Act so that 5-year-old children could at-

By the early 1900s, they had become one of the great success stories in the city's history and this success will be celebrated in every kindergarten class in Toronto this year.

There is to be a gala public anniversary party on April 7 at Casa Loma and, if there is any justice, someone will erect a historical plaque on the site of the present Eaton Centre where the kindergarten was started in the old historic Louisa St. \$chool by Adaline Augusta Marean, Canada's first kindergarten teacher, and James L. Hughes, one of the more legendary figures in Toronto's past.
