A Message from the President

As we leave the Holiday Season and enter a New Year, your executive and I have renewed our commitment to you, the members of District 16, STO/ERO, to pursue our mission of service with increased zeal and enthusiasm.

This will continue to be a year of challenge. The negotiations of the Biennial Review Committee will bring significant changes in our pension reorganization, its means of funding and investment, and possibly an equal sharing with the government for the financing of the benefits, both profits and losses. The success or failure of our "Best Five" Campaign may become an integral part in these negotiations. Furthermore, to quote Mr. Causley: "Whatever the final agreement may be, the one benefit that must not be changed is the one providing for AUTOMATIC ESCALATION". However, a look on the brighter side will show that "the government negotiations have indicated a willingness to explore all suggested improvements to benefits".

What we need now and in the future is that quality of mind or soul that the ancient Greeks called "enthousiasmos", a word roughly meaning being possessed by a god. Under the spell of divine power, ordinary mortals see things beyond the range of human vision. This enthusiasm or ectasy of mind defines the strength of emotion and determination that seems to make all things possible.

However, the belief of the ancients that only the gods can bestow enthusiasm upon their chosen few may be misleading. I contend that this analogy applies most clearly in our contemporary age to a unique community of educators. Teachers, administrators and professors, throughout the educational system, have been endowed with this special gift of enthusiasm. To recall an outstanding teacher from our school days is to remember the enthusiasm he/she displayed while explaining a solution to a difficult mathematical problem, or helping us to unravel a puzzling enigma on our own. They inspired confidence and assurance that we could succeed.

It is well-known that enthusiasm binds people together. We need your ideas to help us work toward the fulfillment of STO objectives, and ultimately develop a progressive association. Five executive members named in this newsletter are eager to answer your inquiries and receive your ideas and suggestions. We never know what we can do until we try!

MEMBERSHIP

STO Memberships are processed through the **STO Office, 1260 Bay Street, Toronto, Ontario, M5R 2B7.** You arrange with STO to have the fee taken off your January Pension Cheque each year. If you do not inform the STO office of the District to which you would like to belong, you will be assigned to the District where you live.

District 16 of STO is the City of Toronto. If your address lies within the boundaries of Toronto, you will be listed under the District 16 membership. If you have informed STO office that you wish to affiliate with the Toronto District, you will be listed under District 16 membership.

If you live outside Toronto and you wish to change your membership to Toronto, it is necessary to inform the STO office of this change --Provincial office, Bay Street address (above) 489-0778. The grants from the Provincial Office are determined by the number of members in each District. 962-9463

Many members wish to be affiliated with the District where they worked rather than where they live. Each District executive plans programs to give members opportunities to meet with former co-workers and the Newsletters share information about people in the District. District 16, Toronto, membership is \$5.00 a year. This annual fee (September 1 to August 31) helps with our mailing costs, meetings and social programs. Upon payment of your annual fee, District 16 (Toronto) you will be sent a membership card and you will be on our active mailing list for a year.
