March General Meeting

Many of our District 16 members enjoyed, with much pleasure, the General Meeting in March. The refreshments and especially the conversation were partly responsible. New faces keep showing up and we are always so happy to see them. However, the presentation by Mr. Bacher from Kodak was extremely interesting and enjoyable to all who were there. Not everyone present was a camera buff, although there were many and he had interesting stories and information for all. We left with a cheerful feeling. Health and Insurance News

- S.T.O. has designed a poster which they hope will be displayed in the staff room in every school in Ontario, beginning in the 1991-92 school year. The poster promotes membership in S.T.O. and outlines the benefits of the S.T.O. Health Plans.
- ♦ Statistics indicate that up to 90% of late applicants (i.e., those who apply after the 60-day eligibility period) are turned down by the insurance company on medical grounds. It is essential that retired teachers are aware of the importance of enrolling in the plans within 60 days of the termination of their school board coverage or coverage under a spouse's plan when no medical examination is required.
- ♦ Health Plan brochures will be available in French, as well as in English, beginning September 1, 1991. These will be available on request.
- Many retirees are under the mistaken impression that they do not require Extended Health Care coverage after reaching age 65. The Ontario Drug Benefit plan covers the full cost of many drugs prescribed for the over-65's, however, there are approximately 2,500 drugs that are not covered which are covered under the S.T.O. Extended Health Care Plan.

 There are also other benefits besides the reimbursement for drugs (i.e., vision care, appliances such as wheelchairs, and the travel emergency medical

plan).

- Drugs that can be purchased over the counter (i.e., they do not require a prescription) are not covered under the Extended Health Care Plan even if they are prescribed by a doctor.
- If a retired teacher dies while covered under his/her school board plan, the spouse may apply to enroll in the S.T.O. Health Plans. If the application is made within 60 days of the school board coverage terminating, evidence of good health is not required. The spouse is also eligible to become an Associate Member of S.T.O.
- ♦ When travelling outside Ontario, participants in the Extended Health Care Plan should take a copy of their Extended Health Care Plan with them so that they are aware of the various benefits available to them should a medical emergency arise.
- ♦ Approximately 615 cheques issued in December and January by Johnson Insurance had not been cashed by mid-March. These have been presumed lost and new cheques were issued on March 21.

You will be doing your retiring friends a great favour if you make them aware of the following:

- 1. When they receive an application for S.T.O. membership in their retirement package it is to their great benefit to fill it out and remit to S.T.O., 1260 Bay Street promptly. There are benefits that they are not able to receive without it. S.T.O. helps mostly by being their watchdog.
- 2. When they receive information regarding S.T.O. health and dental plans, as well as out of country coverage, they should follow it up immediately and contact Johnson Insurance, Richmond Hill.

Other plans and spousal plans terminate at a certain time and/or age. S.T.O.'s goes on forever. One must join the S.T.O. plan within 60 days of the cessation of their former plan or a physical examination is required. Many, many people have missed the 60 day cut off and thus sadly require an examination. This can be overcome by joining your S.T.O. plan as early as possible after retirement.

Do your friends a favour. They may be too busy retiring to take note!
