DID YOU KNOW?

- * In Canada, the percentage of adults who volunteer their time and skills to groups and organizations is 27%. That works out to be about 5,368 people sharing the gift of time.
- * Women are more likely to be volunteers than men, but it is a close ratio:

55% female = 2.5 million women

45% male = 2.4 million men

- * The age group with the highest participation rate in volunteering is 35-44 year olds.
- * The most frequent reason given for people not doing volunteer work is that they have never been asked.
- * The Reason Volunteers Are Not Paid:
 - * Is not because they are worthless
 - * But, because they are Priceless

DID YOU MISS THIS?

The executive of District 16 STO/ERO depend entirely upon the support of <u>you</u>, our members, for the success of the Toronto group. One very positive and apparent way to strengthen this is by your attendance at the general meetings. It is there that we get a sense of whom we are going to bat for and how you respond. Otherwise, we are sometimes in the dark, so to speak.

There are times, after one of these general meetings, that we say -- "Those who did not attend really missed a wonderful speaker/presentation" and, "Did you notice how many people met colleagues that they hadn't seen in a long time?"

This is especially true of the March 4th meeting. Due to unavoidable circumstances, the speaker could not be named in the February Newsletter. However, for those who did come out, it was a very compelling, forthright and thought provoking presentation. Lou Wise, a former Director of the Teaching Aids Department, who had earlier given us a glimpse of his expertise in aerial photography, was the presenter.

This time, however, Lou favoured us with his slide presentation and talk, "This is Melanie", based on the upbringing of his lovely daughter Melanie. It was a poignant pictorial diary of the years from her birth in 1960 to the present. Melanie is a resident in a group home in Scarborough for several developmentally handicapped young persons. But Lou wanted us to understand that first, and most important, she <u>is</u> a person - and a terrific one at that.

Lou and his wife, Lena, have addressed Melanie's needs with affection, understanding, dignity, perseverance and consistency. They have both been deeply involved in the events that led, several years ago, to the realization of Project '81 (now Developmental Services for Adults) -- a collection of six group homes and a developmental centre with its daily program, all located in Scarborough. In the years ahead, there will need to be many more group homes or other forms of residence if community living for developmentally handicapped persons is to be fully realized in Metro and other parts of the province. The waiting lists are very long, particularly in Metro, so much remains to be done to ensure that these handicapped people need not live in institutions away from their own communities and families.

Lou concluded his presentation with a few comments on volunteering. He explained that, in a sense, he is a volunteer who goes on trips with Melanie and her friends in the summer; to a swim program at the North York YMCA once a week year 'round -- and as a pilot-in-command when he takes Melanie flying in his light aircraft!

But many more volunteers are needed to provide opportunities for more of this group to go swimming at the "Y"; to go on periodic summer trips with small groups; to have someone assist them during lunch time at Gooderham Developmental Centre or to spend time with one of the fellas or

gals in one of the many activities that go on. Many of the things that do go on can only occur on a one-to-one basis. Just think how much good <u>you</u> might get from a once a week dip in the pool at the "Y"!
