Travel Emergency Claims (World Access)

There were 264 claims, an increase of 43 (19%) claims over 1991-1992. Of the 264 claims, 176 were in January, February and March.

ODB - Ontario Drug Benefit

This program is for Ontario residents age 65+ and social assistance recipients.

- ~ full coverage of drugs listed in ODB Formulary prescribed by a doctor or dentist
- ~ requires generic substitution of drugs unless otherwise specified by prescribing physician
- ~ prescriptions not prescribed and purchased in Ontario not covered
- ~ includes approximately 2300 drugs
- ~ drugs are listed by therapeutic classification, e.g. Cardiovascular Drugs, Central Nervous System Drugs, etc.
- ~ Formulary **revised semi-annually** most revisions are reductions in benefits, e.g. antihistamines and sunscreens were removed in 1992
- ~ * Your Extended Health Care Plan with Johnson Insurance, through STO/ERO, covers over 4000 drugs not covered by the ODB program
- ~ ODB covers 1.2 million seniors who generate 27 claims each per year at an average cost of \$24.80
- ~ total STO/ERO Extended Health Care participants: 18,455
 - Participants 65+: 16,091 (87%)
- ~ effective May, 1993, payment of oxygen products limited to a fixed monthly fee (\$585 liquid; \$365 concentrate)
- ~ Ministry of Health plans to implement a cost-sharing program

Many of our members will be interested to know that the <u>In Memoriam</u> at the senate meeting was to the late **Art McAdam** of District 16 who was the first President of STO/ERO in 1968-69.

MARGARET K. RUSSELL

On October 12, in the beautiful village of Norval, a special birthday party was held for a special lady. Margaret K. Russell was ninety years young. One hundred and sixty guests, including many ex-Givins teachers, came from far and near to celebrate this milestone with Margaret.

Margaret started teaching on the Toronto occasional staff in 1923. She remembers that getting a permanent position was worrisome because she was a Liberal and teachers at that time were expected to be Conservative. Margaret started teaching at Givins School in 1924 and was there long enough to teach children of former students and become a much respected institution throughout the Givins community. She still is in touch with some of her students. Margaret retired from Givins in 1967. There was always a strength about Margaret. She could be counted on to speak her piece whenever things were not progressing as they should. Ninety years of living have not diminished that wonderful quality. Happy birthday Margaret!

At our 25th Anniversary Luncheon, which was held on October 28th at the Ramada Hotel Downtown - City Hall, **Bob Breens**, brought greetings from the **Teachers' Pension Plan Board**. A brief synopsis of his message follows:

- the Teachers' Pension Plan Board is separate from the Superannuated Teachers of Ontario, but a longstanding relationship exists between the two
- ~ the Pension Plan Board deducts the STO/ERO fees and medical premiums from pension payments ~ the Pension Plan Board works with STO/ERO on the HELP PROJECT (finding lost pensioners)

~ the Social Contract will not affect your pension in any way

~ your pension payments are not affected by the three-year wage freeze

~ indexing for January will be 1.9%

~ the total assets of \$30 billion makes the Teachers' Pension Plan the largest pension plan in Canada and ranks among the nation's largest financial institutions

~ Pension Newsletter - twice a year

~ Annual Report

~ Information Service (Phone-A-Memo): Recorded messages give access to general information on all aspects of your pension **N.B.**

~ if you move, the Pension Plan Board needs your new address and phone number and your new bank account
