FROM YOUR HEALTH/INSURANCE REPRESENTATIVE

All members of the S.T.O. Health Plans should now have received their Revised Brochures for the 1994-95 year. As there are no changes in the benefits or premiums in the Dental Plan, please keep your 1993 brochure as one will not be issued for 1994.

The premiums and benefit changes are as follows:

Dental_Pian (#983431) - No Benefit Changes

Premiums: <u>Single:</u> \$30.12 <u>Couple:</u> \$59.39 <u>Family</u>: \$74.06

Semi-Private Hospital Plan (#983429)

- Benefit remains at \$100 per day

Premiums: <u>Single</u>: \$15.49 <u>Couple</u>: \$30.96 <u>Family</u>: \$36.37

Extended Health Care Plan (#983430)

- Annual deductible for drugs to be removed.
- Annual limit (calendar year) for prescription drugs to be increased from \$1000.00 to \$1100.00 per person.
- Oxygen and its administration outside province of residence to be added.
- Vision care maximum of \$300.00 for family coverage to be removed. Coverage to be limited to \$150.00 per person in any two calendar years.

*Participants in the Extended Health Care Plan are asked to pay for out-of-province/country claims that are less than \$500.00. The bills should be submitted first to the participant's Provincial Government Health Insurance Plan and then to Johnson Insurance for payment of the balance.

Miss Gray Remembered...

Arlene Feeley's letter (Miss Gray loved students. May 1), in which she remembers her Grade 1 teacher. Mabel Gray, brought back many memories for me. Miss Gray was my Grade 1 teacher also at Annette St. Public School in 1936.

During the Depression years. Miss Gray rewarded good work or effort with an apple or orange, treats not always affordable for her pupils.

Miss Gray took early retirement due to ill health. However, she was a great believer in helping herself, and with good nutrition, Vitamin E and her long daily walks, her improved health and vitality were a marvel to all who knew her.

Following severe injuries from a bad fall. Miss Gray moved to St. Anne's Towers on Dufferin St. and continued to walk several miles to her church in the High Park area every Sunday, regardless of the weather.

Unfortunately, Miss Gray was hit and killed by a car while crossing Bathurst St. on one of her daily walks. And she wasn't jay-walking!

I'm sure that many of us who learned to read from Miss Gray have many fond memories of her.
