PROFILE OF A UNIQUE MEMBER

Do you have: QUESTIONS ABOUT YOUR PENSION?

QUESTIONS ABOUT THE PENSION PROCESS?

Your District 16 Pension Concerns Sub Committee has met during this past Fall to establish a process for addressing questions about your pensions and to disseminate pertinent information.

T One question frequently asked is:

Your Committee has developed the following information to assist you in your Pension decision-making...

As you know, the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) and the Teachers' Pension Plan (TPP) are integrated. While you were teaching, you contributed to both the TPP and the CPP. Your TPP contribution was reduced to partially offset the amount you paid to CPP.

If you are under the age of 65, you may be wondering when you should be taking your CPP.


If you decide to take the CPP early, the amount will be reduced by 6% per year depending on how early you take it. For example, if your CPP pension at age 65 would be \$5,000.00 and you choose to take it at age 61, your annual CPP pension would be \$3,800 (\$5,000x76%)

Your decision should be based on two factors:

- 1. How long you think you will live.
- and 2. When you want most of your retirement income.

If you take CPP as early as age 60, you will have more money early in your retirement because your TPP pension will not be reduced until you are 65.

The following graph should help you:



This page was included. with the January 1995 mail out. As you can see, if you decide to wait until age 65 to take the CPP pension, you would have to receive it until at least age 75 to earn the same dollars compared with the total dollars earned if you had taken the CPP pension at age 60.

However, not everyone will consider this an advantage. For example, if you live into your 80's or 90's, you may receive less money overall.

When you retired, your TPP pension underwent a calculation process which provided the amount your TPP pension will be reduced to allow for CPP integration at age 65. (Called a "bridge" benefit.) Once you turn 65, your TTP pension will be reduced by this amount, The reduction is based on your credited service in the plan and will be the same regardless of when you decide to take your CPP pension.

You can contact the Income Security Programs Branch of your local Health and Welfare Office for an estimate of your CPP pension. (Look in the blue Government of Canada pages in your telephone book for their number.)

☐ Another question frequently asked about the pension process is:→What is the Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan Board?

It is:

- -an independent corporation established in 1990 by a Provincial Statute (Teachers' Pension Act).
- co-sponsored by a partnership between the Ontario Government and the Plan members who are represented by the Ontario Teachers' Federation.
- partners are responsible for defining Plan benefits.
- each partner appoints 4 members to the Plan's board of directors.
- partners jointly select the chairperson.
- → Is STO/ERO represented on the board?
 - No.
 - however, some members of the board representing OTF are retired former educators, e.g., Duncan Green.
