

Quips from the Spring Luncheon

The S.T.O./E.R.O. **Spring Luncheon** was held on **May 4th** in the Imperial Room at the Royal York Hotel. Over 175 members enjoyed the social hour and cash bar prior to eating. After a delirious luncheon (during which we were entertained by Miss Becky Windhager, the Head of Music at Harbord Collegiate); Arlene Freeman introduced the guest speaker, **Gordon Cressy**, President and C.E.O. of The Learning Partnership. In the initial stages of his message, Mr. Cressy stated that he wished to do three things: set the tone for the last five years of the Century, bring us signs of hope, and elaborate specific ways in which we can see the light at the end of the tunnel. He spoke of the present cutbacks and restraints, of the difficulties of the single parent, of the need for youth to be in contact with grandparents, of the present-day advances in technology and of violent crime in our streets. He advocated that business and education work together to form partnerships. We have to keep in touch, we have to take time, time for our friends, for family, for relationships and for youth. Mr. Cressy's speech was both inspiring and encouraging for the future.
