## ALLAN W. ROBB

The Executive of District 16 has nominated Al as a candidate for S.T.O.'s Founding Members Award. Al has devoted a lifetime of service to teachers at local and provincial levels.

Born and raised in Fort William, he attended Toronto Normal School following a stint in the R.C.A.F. Al came to the Toronto Board after four years teaching in Fort William.

He taught at Malton Emergency Housing, Davenport and Kent, and served as Vice-principal at Pauline, Winona and Lord Dufferin. Appointed Principal at John Fisher, he was subsequently transferred to Park and Kent from which he retired in 1981.

Al served on the O.T.F. Board of Governors from 1967 to 1972, as President of O.P.S.M.T.F., 1970-71 and as President of T.P.S.P.A., 1973-74. In 1971 he was appointed a Fellow of the Ontario Teachers' Federation.

He was elected President of District 16 in 1985; from 1985-90 he served on the S.T.O. Provincial Executive and was President in 1988.

Two of his basic tenets are:

- 1) a belief in the right of all people to be able to retire and enjoy life without any reduction in living standard, and
- 2) a belief that it is S.T.O.'s duty to provide services needed by all members and, in the area of health plans, a standard rate for all regardless of age.

Al was recently elected President of St. Clair 60 Service Club. It was founded in 1926 by businessmen who could only afford 60 minutes away from business for lunch once a month. The Principal of Oakwood C.I. was always a member and, over the years, other Toronto Board of Education staff members have joined.

Al enjoys gardening, swimming (10 laps daily, <u>without</u> water wings), sailing, cross country skiing, travelling throughout Ontario and baking. Have you enjoyed his shortbread on one of Hank's trips??

Blessed with 4 daughters, their spouses and six grandsons, Al enjoys his family tremendously. One of his grandsons is a leader of a rock group; Al has auditioned for the group five times, as of August, 1995.

## IN MEMORY OF DAVID CLEE

David was a longtime convenor of the monthly Social Programme of Club Sixteen with our organization and, as such, he was the first person to greet me when I attended my initial meeting a few years ago. His warm smile and friendly ways immediately showed me that the District 16 organization was a group which would really appeal to me...and so I stayed.

David had a similar effect on many people in his long career. At a recent Travelogue programme, "Aspects of India", which David presented, one of his former students attended...just to meet him again.

David Clee was born and taught first in England. On arrival in Canada he taught Geography and Math at Haliburton High School, then at Forest Hill High School in 1952 and on to the Toronto Teachers College in 1953. (Some of our members will remember him there.) He and his wife, Christine, were married in Wales in 1953. David's great knowledge and love of books led him to a position with the Curriculum Department for the Ministry of Education in 1961. While working under Bill Davis, he helped form TVO using his experience and interest in education and film. David completed his career with the Faculty of Education in 1966, retiring in 1978.

David's son and wife enjoyed their various trips to Europe, Australia, New Zealand and the Far East, but Christine declined with India. It was too hot for her!

David will be sadly missed by his many friends and associates.
