THE CONSULAR AWARENESS PROGRAM

BON VOYAGE but....To better prepare Canadians who are travelling abroad for business or pleasure, the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade launched the Consular Awareness Program in 1991 which currently provides the following:

- A toll-free travel advisory Hot Line 1-800-276-6788 offers current information to travellers on conditions in specific countries;
- * A detailed booklet entitled *Bon Voyage, But...* explains what precautions travellers should take before they travel and what a Canadian mission can and cannot do to help Canadians in another country;
- * A series of five *Bon Voyage*, *But...* brochures that provide information on such topics as insurance, health, cultural expectations, personal security and a list of do's and don'ts of international travel

Travellers can obtain these materials by calling InfoCentre, the Department's information and distribution service, at 1-800-267-8376

International Travel

- **DO** ensure your passport is valid and you have visas or entry documents for every country you intend to visit.
 - **DO** keep a separate record of your passport details.
 - **DO** have travel and medical insurance to deal with emergencies.
- **DO** carry a prescription for all medication -- and **Don't** forget vaccinations or medical declarations you may need for other countries.
 - **DO** know the location of the Canadian mission in the countries you visit, and contact them in the event of an emergency.

A TRIBUTE TO AL SWEETMAN

Ine name 'Al Sweetman" has become almost synonymous with the Toronto Board of Education. Very few can remember when Al was not part of the Toronto Board.

In 1923 he began his career as an elementary school teacher and worked his way up through the various steps to become inspector.

Never, in any conversation, do you hear a negative comment about Al Sweetman. The adjectives you do hear are kind, gentle, helpful, dedicated, good sense of humour, an encourager, a gentleman. Obviously, he was highly respected. At one time, when he was an inspector, he was appointed as Toronto Board representative to the salary negotiation team. One of the teacher representatives at that time remembers how Al helped the teachers during the discussions.

Al considered it an honour to be in the teaching profession and has always been loyal to the Toronto Board.

After retirement he was involved in the development of S.T.O./E.R.O. One of his activities was driving around the Province with a representative of the Separate School Board to assist in the formation of district organizations. Also, he was very active in organizing Club Sixteen.

Through subsequent years, Al has continued to support S.T.O./E.R.O. and has been involved in its many activities. He still attends meetings and luncheons and is still a regular at the mailing sessions. And, what's more, he is still a "nice guy"!

It has become a tradition to present pins and/or certificates to members who have made a significant contribution to District 16 - S.T.O./E.R.O. But, Al is special. A gift of a suitably inscribed book <u>Art in Toronto Schools</u> was presented at the October luncheon in recognition of his contribution to the teaching profession and to S.T.O./E.R.O.

HIGHLIGHTS

This fall's 49th Senate commenced with a rousing version of O'Canada, on the morning following the "Referendum". This observer was truly moved.

A new full time Executive Director has been selected after a Canada-wide search, short listing, and interview process. Sound familiar? His name is Pascal LaRouche, who presently lives in Toronto and is employed by the Simcoe County Separate School Board.

Arising from the May, 1995 Senate -- Health plan rates, for current policy year, have been maintained at 1994-95 levels for semi-private hospital, extended health care and dental.

O.T.F. Negotiations Committee has a series of proposed changes to the Pension Plan that have been drawn up (See O.T.F. Newsletter of October, 1995) and will present for negotiation. It seems, from discussion at Senate, that it will be years before any of these surface.

A study will be conducted to determine the feasibility of providing honorary membership to those 80 years and over or to others with disabilities and, therefore, unable to participate in the activities of S.T.O./E.R.O.

A motion to study reducing Senate meetings from 2 per year to 1 was defeated.
