# MINDING YOUR MONEY

## Which is better for you - the new Seniors' Benefit or the old OAS/GIS system?

Much has been written about the proposed **Seniors' Benefit** announced by Revenue Canada in the March 6, 1996 budget. Many articles predict dire consequences for Seniors without pointing out that there is an **option** for Seniors and their spouses who reached age 60 by December 1995. If you, your spouse, a friend or relative reached 60 years of age by December 31, 1995, you have the **option** of choosing between the new Seniors' Benefit system or continuing along with the current OAS/GIS system. (The March 6, 1996 budget proposed sweeping changes to our publicly supported pension system - including a new income-tested **Seniors' Benefit** that will begin in the year 2001). The Federal Government alleges that 75% of seniors will receive the same or greater benefits. Consequently, it might be advantageous for *some* seniors over 60 to opt for the **new** system, which will replace the Old Age Security (OAS), Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS), Age Credit and Pension Income credit for middle and low income seniors. The new plan will be tax free and fully indexed for inflation.

S.T.O./E.R.O. members, their friends and relatives need to know:

o Is it better for me (us) to remain with the current system or opt for the new?

o What are the income tax consequences for high income earners?

#### TAX TIPS

The resolutions that you make on January 1st (and keep) can produce significant tax benefits on December 31st - and beyond.

There are a number of tax strategies that produce best results when initiated early:

#### Young People With Part-Time Jobs

Many Seniors have grandchildren, nieces, nephews, etc., who have part-time jobs. Few people are aware, however, of future tax benefits available to both the young people themselves and their parents by implementing tax strategies now.

When young people *report* earned income from paper routes, child care, part-time jobs, etc., they create **unused** RRSP room that can prove very useful in the future. (The student's Non-refundable Tax Credits will normally prevent any tax from being paid on such income in the year it is earned.) This unused RRSP room accumulates over the years and can reduce or even remove tax payable later when students work to put themselves through school.

Later, when working students begin to earn *taxable income*, purchasing and claiming just enough RRSP contribution to reduce the student's taxable income to *zero* enables the higherearning parent to transfer both *Tuition Fees* and the *Education Amount* to themselves as tax credits. Having built up *unused* RRSP room over the years, thus, produces significant doublebarreled tax benefits later on.
