PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings to all!

It's my sincere wish that you are enjoying this fabulous fall! Last November many of our members walked alongside teachers in support of a better education system than what Bill 160 offered. It appears that collective agreements are being settled and schools are returning to a "normal" routine.

However, future challenges lie ahead and hopefully each will do whatever one can to preserve the legacy of commitment and hard work that made Ontario's education system the envy of many.

At the Annual Meeting in October at the Royal York it was refreshing to learn that in spite of the recent turmoil in the stock market the Teachers' Pension Plan is well positioned to withstand such downward trends in the market. Claude Lamoureux, Director and Chief Executive Officer of the Teachers' Pension Plan confirmed that in his estimate the plan will suffer a minimal loss of 1-2% over the year -- an enviable track record in comparison to other funds.

This Fall's Senate Meeting will include a one-day workshop on "Political Action". In order to preserve what RTO/ERO members have earned over the years and especially in trying to obtain a stronger voice in regard to our pension plan, it is necessary that RTO/ERO becomes united and more involved at both the local and provincial levels.

District 16 has approved two new committees to be chaired by Pat Carson, Past President -- A Political Action Committee and a Millennium Committee. More news about these initiatives to follow.

This will be the last free newsletter for newly retired colleagues who have not joined RTO/ERO Provincial. We urge you to join our association and become active in our District's activities as well as enjoy the benefits RTO/ERO offers. The time was June, 1970; the place -- Thornhill Golf and Country Club; the occasion -- an assembly of the Toronto Public School Principals' Association, to bid a formal farewell to **Mr. N.A. BENEFIT CHANGES EFFECTIVE JANUARY, 1, 1999

New Benefit Under Semi-Private Hospital Plan:

A **Convalescent Care** benefit will be added under the Semi-Private Hospital Plan to cover some of the costs of home care upon hospital discharge. This new benefit will be effective January 1, 1999. The Semi-Private Hospital Plan will reimburse 80% of eligible expenses up to a maximum payment of \$50 per day for up to 5 days following a minimum hospital admission of 24 hours.

Convalescent Care may be rendered by persons without professional skills or training, working under the supervision of a Home Care Agency or a Home Health Care Agency. The level of care includes assisting with or in:

- (a) activities of daily living (eating, toileting, transferring positions, bathing and dressing);
- (b) ambulation and exercise;
- (c) self-administered medications;
- (d) homemaker services or home health aide services; and
- (e) services needed to maintain or improve the patient's functional ability.

Reimbursement will be made upon written recommendation of a physician and completion of a Johnson Incorporated authorization form. The home caretaker must not ordinarily reside in the home of the participant or any of the participant's dependents and must not be related to the participant by blood or marriage.

New Benefit Under Dental Plan:

Partial Dentures will be covered effective January 1, 1999 under the dental benefit for Major Restorative services. Charges will be reimbursed at 50% of eligible expenses. Payments will be included in the annual maximum of \$700 for Fixed Bridges.

Replacement of an existing partial denture will be covered if:

- (a) necessitated by the extraction, loss or fracture of an additional natural tooth while covered under this plan;
- (b) the existing denture is at least five years old and cannot be made serviceable; or
- (c) the existing denture is temporary and is replaced by a permanent denture within 12 months of its installation.

Replacement of lost or stolen dentures or the duplication of dentures will not be covered.

Rate Guarantee Extended!

Monthly Rates under the Extended Health Care, Semi-Private Hospital and Dental Plans will remain <u>unchanged</u> **until January 1, 2000**:

Retail Sales Tax will be added to the monthly rates, where required by law.
